He presented about building houses for birds and bats, taking into consideration their habitat, territorial needs and nesting preferences. Scott is an engaging speaker, well versed in his subject. He intersperses his information with engaging anecdotes and experiences he has had. It was a delightful presentation.

The Wildflower of the month, presented by Kathy Liska, is our native Shooting Star.



Dodecatheon pulchellum ssp. pauciflorum

AKA - Pretty or Few-Flowered Shooting Star Family: Primulaceae (Primrose)

Pretty Shooting Star has showy flowers that occur in 3-5 flower clusters on an erect, leafless stem that grows from the plant's base and reaches 18" tall. The flowers have pink to magenta colored petals that sweep back from the white, yellow, and dark purple center point of the flower. Shooting Star leaves are 2-10 inches long, spatulate to spoon-shaped, and blunt with smooth margins.

Blooming Time: June **Height:** 10-18 inches tall

Habitat: Open Woods, Meadows, Subalpine, Coastal areas, Bogs and Wetlands in Southeastern and

Southcentral Alaska.





A similar species, Dodecatheon frigidum - aka Frigid Shooting Star, is found in Alpine Meadows and Tundra except in Southeastern and Southcentral coastal areas. This plant is shorter at about 8" tall, with spade-shaped leaves. Flowers bloom from mid-June to late-July and are darker and rarely have a yellow band.

Other ssp. includes Alaskanum - a shorter coastal area species, and Jeffreyii - found in the Southeastern and coastal areas, which also rarely has a yellow band or ring.

We have a request in to one business for tool sharpening instruction for the summer. If that does not work out, we do have someone that will teach it in the early fall.

We will need to go in ahead of time to help clean up from the winter and again to set tables for the sale. Please keep your eyes peeled for information about dates. Start to dig up plants early and plan to share your bounty with other gardeners. A nice benefit is that you can help offset the cost of your plant habit this way!

The Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center has expressed interest in having a new wildflower garden overseen by our club. It will be good publicity for us and perhaps working on the plot will include a trip through the park. The Executive Board and our Wildflower Education Chair, Marilyn Barker, will be working with AWCC on developing details, plant selection and planting design. Members will be encouraged to donate special native wildflowers to the project.

Remember, National Garden Clubs Inc. is sponsoring the Flower Judging School and Plant and Design symposiums June 13-17. Attendees may take the entire presentation for certification as a Flower Show Judge, OR take the entire presentation for educational purposes, OR take any parts of the presentations they are interested in. This is a great opportunity for gardeners to hear experts expound on design principles and Iris and Lilacs hardy to our area.
