## What's growing now?

This month's presentation was by Ginger Hudson. Her topic was **Remembering Verna**. As most of you know, Verna E. Pratt was a champion of wildflowers in Alaska. She was self-taught, and her knowledge of flora, genus, species and the intricate differences was infinite. If she did not know something, she made sure to find out. She was generous with her knowledge and open and friendly to all. Ginger shared how she had met Verna and how after Verna passed away in January 2017, Annie Nevaldine, another outstanding Alaska gardener persuaded her to write Verna's biography. Combining her studies for her master's degree, Ginger is compiling facts, stories, and peoples' impressions of Verna to produce her book in a few years. As noted by some present, both Verna and Annie were now gone, having passed away that very week, two and one year ago respectively. A few people got to voice some of their remembrances of Verna and all who knew her recalled their many interactions with that great lady fondly.

The wildflower of the month was Grass of Parnassus, presented by Paul Marmora. He related how that flower was firmly attached to his remembrances of Verna, as he can always hear her pronouncing the name, "Grahss of Pahnahssus" in her distinctive New England accent.

The 2019 Executive Board was installed by outgoing president Jeanette Bock: Kathy Liska and Paul Marmora are 2019 Co-Presidents. Elaine Estey will continue as Vice-President, and Beverly Luedke-Chan is filling the Treasurer position again. Tobi Harvey has accepted the Secretary position. Jeanette Bock will be on the board as past-president and Annita Magee is continuing as Member-At-Large.

Kathy Liska announced that the plaque honoring Verna Pratt, sponsored by the Wildflower Garden Club (**WfGC**), has been ordered and should arrive in 4-6 weeks.

Flower Show School training, sponsored by the National Garden Clubs has been scheduled for June and October of this year. To be a nationally certified Flower judge, you must belong to a garden club linked to the National Garden Clubs, Inc. The clubs in Alaska that qualify are: **Anchorage**, **Wildflower**, **Eagle River**, **Fairbanks**, and **Ketchikan Garden Clubs**. If you wish to be nationally certified, it is fairly easy and inexpensive to join one of those clubs. There are other requirements to maintain your certifications. Ask one of the garden clubs for more information. You may take parts of the training without the certification for learning, if you desire. There are also a couple of symposia available: one on pelargoniums and one on mechanics of flower design. Good news is the Master Gardeners are supporting using parts of these training sessions for Advanced Master Gardener credits.

WfGC is still looking for an artist to make a statue of Calypso orchids in honor of deceased founder and member Sally Karablenikoff. We have found an artist who is entertaining some designs to present to us.

There are still opportunities for people to donate in memory of either the plaque for Verna or the Statue for Sally. The additional funds will go to help toward the purchase of and setting of a substantial boulder to be placed at the Start of the Verna Pratt Wildflower Trail and for the mounting of the plaque at the Alaska Botanical Gardens. There may also be possibilities for additional signage along the trail.

Kathy Liska reminded us that the Marigold Giveaway at the Midtown Mall is scheduled for 20APR, and the marigold seeds should be started in early February to be blooming in time for the show. Kathy shared some tips in terms of full light and regularly brushing (petting) the seedlings as they come up to encourage strong stems and compact growth.

The 2019 Yearbooks were passed out at the meeting, and the rest of them were mailed out on Monday.
