Marilyn Barker and Paul Marmora met with Lily at the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center this month. She has taken over the establishing of the planned wildflower garden. The plan is to leave the existing garden until fall, when they will move the existing non-native plants out, build natural looking terraces to provide both height and some shade on the far side to accommodate native plants that do not thrive in full sun. In early spring 2020, we will plant the garden with native wildflowers. It should be a fun time installing the garden. Please look to see if you have any natives that you wish to donate to the garden. We will compile a list and make selections from what is available in order to make a natural looking setting. Our commitment to AWCC is to plant and maintain the

garden for them. They will post a sign telling people about our donation and care. We would like to compile a list of names of people that would like to be a part of the work crew both to install the garden and to participate in monthly maintenance trips. Remember that the day you go to work, you have access to the park as a visitor. We will need at least two people per month to go down to work the garden.
