
## Club Business

## Wildflower of the Month

#### Juniperus communis var. depressa

Synonyms: Juniperus canadensis, Juniperus communis ssp. depressa, Juniperus depressa

Common names: Alaska Juniper, Common Juniper, Old Field Juniper, Prostrate Juniper

Junipers are a member of the Cypress family, and J. communis is considered the most widely spread native conifer in the world. It is native to the western and midrange United States, north through Canada and Alaska, into Greenland and Northern



Europe, with one isolated stand in the Atlas Mountains in Africa. Although quite adaptable, the Common Juniper thrives in sunny, dry soils in wooded areas, on hillsides and mountainous locales, in cooler climates.

In Alaska, the shrub is commonly 12-18 inches and rarely grows more than three feet tall, though in other native habitats it can grow to six to eight feet, very occasionally even growing to 35 or 40 feet in well protected areas. A spreading shrub, communis can grow in patches up to 12 feet wide, often the thick woody stems will bury themselves in the soil and the clumps of foliage are quite far from the main root ball. The insignificant blooms are yellow and often occur in June in Alaska.

The foliage consists of needles growing in whorls of three sharp and pointy spikes. For most of the year, the needles are a bluish green, although winter foliage is often a yellowish brown. The bark is exfoliating and is a reddish-brown in color.





The fruit are small, waxy, somewhat hard, and berry-like and covered in a bluish gray powdery coating. The 'berries' are used to flavor gin, cooked with meats and fish, and in red cabbage dishes. Young shoots are sometimes used to make cold tea.
