The lovely **Rose** and fragrant **Honeysuckle** are considered the June flower. Belonging to the large family of **Rosaceae**, there are many types of roses and this flower is said to have gotten its name from the Goddess of Love, Aphrodite. The flowers are abundant in June and this is probably the reason why it is considered the month's flower. Although the symbolism for roses varies with color, the flower is generally associated with love and beauty. Red roses mean passion and white roses symbolize purity.

Although the honeysuckle has had many different flower meanings throughout history, today it is predominantly viewed as a symbol of happiness. It can often be used to symbolize devotion and everlasting bonds, too. The scientific name for the honeysuckle, *Lonicera japonica*, is derived from the name of the Renaissance botanist, Adam Lonicer. Plain and simple, the name is a tribute to this man.

Shared by Christie Holshouser - While most of our plants are just emerging, we can always count on the rhubarb to be ready first! The first rhubarb crisp is always the best, so we're sharing our recipe. This recipe is from Shelia Burgh and came out of the Pioneers of Alaska Cookbook Copyright 1988.

Rhubarb Crunch

1 cup flour
1 cup brown sugar
³/₄ cup oatmeal
¹/₂ cup butter, melted
4 cups rhubarb, cut
³/₄ cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1 cup water
1 teaspoon vanilla

(Berries or apples can be added as well)

Mix flour, brown sugar, oatmeal, and melted butter till crumbly. Cut 4 cups rhubarb. Bring to boil sugar, cornstarch, water, and vanilla. Press half crumb mixture in bottom of 8-inch square pan. Add rhubarb, spreading evenly. Pour boiled liquid over rhubarb. Top with remaining crumb mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serve with ice cream. Enjoy!
