Wildflowers who bloomed this month

The December birth flowers are Holly and Paperwhite Narcissus.



Celtic and Druidic tradition held holly to be a sacred plant with protective qualities, and believed that it warded off evil spirits and brought good luck to homes, especially during the winter solstice. Later, Christian beliefs held that the sharp edges of the leaves represented the crown of thorns that Jesus was given and that the berries represented the blood he shed as a sacrifice for humankind.

Holly symbolizes protection, love, and hope. It is associated with rebirth and renewal, making it a perfect flower for December, symbolizing the end of one year and the beginning of another.

According to Greek mythology, Narcissus was a beautiful young man who fell in love with his own reflection and, after withering away and dying of unrequited love, he turned into the beautiful and fragrant flower named after him.

The paperwhite narcissus symbolizes renewal, purity, and new beginnings. Being that they can be forced to flower in winter or very early spring, paperwhites are a popular holiday gift.



The paperwhite narcissus also has importance in various cultures and religions. It is a popular flower to use during Chanukkah, as it represents light, hope, and rebirth which are the holiday's themes. In some Christian traditions, paperwhites symbolize the birth of Christ.
